Racoons and Sins Grow up

Gary Richmond, in A View From the Zoo, tells the following story:

Bandit was irresistible. No raccoon that ever existed had more natural cuteness than this ninety-day-old bundle of mischief. When Julie bought him at the pet store, she was sure they would be lifelong friends. Everywhere she went, he went usually perched on her shoulder. Bandit's habit of holding Julie's cheeks in his paws and looking into her eyes with sparkling curiosity always melted her and solicited an affectionate kiss and hug. And he grew. Eighteen months passed, and Bandit became a strapping twenty-five pound adolescent raccoon, still full of mischief only slightly less playful. He still loved affection, rode on her shoulders, and seemed to be a one-raccoon advertisement that raccoons make great pets.

A friend of Julie's mentioned Julie and Bandit to the zoo veterinarian one day and inquired as to why more people didn't keep raccoons at pets. His answer was revealing. "They undergo a glandular change at about twenty-four months. After that they become unpredictable, independent, and often attack their owners." "Are there exceptions?" the friend inquired. "None that I know of," he said thoughtfully. "Then Julie is likely to be bitten?" "Any time, now, I should think," the doctor added with conviction.

Since a thirty-pound raccoon can be equal to a one hundred pound dog in a scrap, Julie's friend felt compelled to mention the coming change to Julie. She sat and listened politely as he explained what an eminent world authority had shared concerning raccoons and their nature. This is how she responded. "It will be different for me. Bandit is different." And she smiled as she added, "Bandit wouldn't hurt me. He just wouldn't."

Three months later Julie underwent plastic surgery for facial lacerations sustained when her adult raccoon attacked her for no apparent reason. Bandit was released into the wild.

A striking parallel exists in the spiritual realm. Sin is fun. It's pleasurable (Hebrews 11:25). It's cute, playful and exciting (cf Luke 15:13). It's often couched in a form that appears perfectly harmless. We flirt with it. We invite it into our homes, fully intending to rid ourselves of it at the first sign of harmful effects. But the more time we spend with it, the more it becomes a part of our lives – the harder it is to imagine life without it. Then the day comes when it reaches maturity and it strikes the death blow – "and sin, when it is full-grown, brings forth death" (Jas. 1:15). Listen to your doctor. The wages of sin is death (Romans 6:23).
